The first of its kind!


Animated videos set the scene with various everyday situations that can be difficult for people with autism and the people that accompany them. A quiz offers different responses for each situation. Each response awards more or less points.

In addition to the responses provided by the game, Tsara also provides access to additional information about autism: recommendations, guides, videos...

Designed for parents, teachers and friends, Tsara allows you to choose your role and progress through the game freely or in 'history' mode in order to go back over a particular situation.



Official recommendations

The responses set out by Tsara are derived from autism-related recommendations given by the National Health Authority (HAS), the National Agency for the Evaluation of the Quality of Social and Medico-social Establishments and Services (ANESM) and the Ministry of Education in France.

The scenarios are based on accounts from real-life situations. They have been approved by a committee of French experts.
